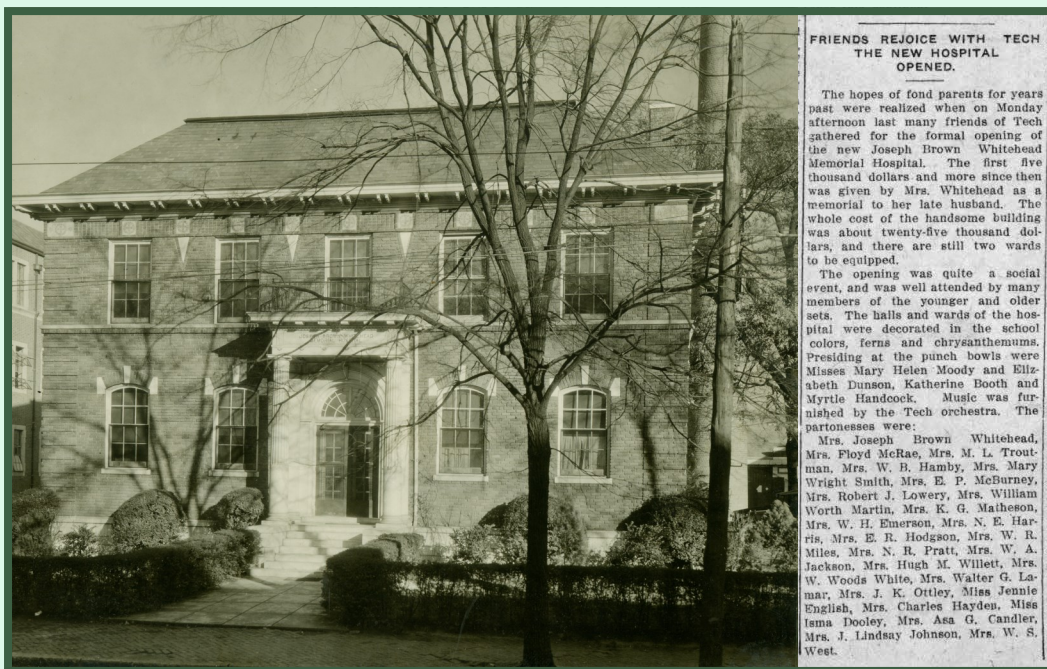

### Multiple Autisms: A contemporary history of autism genomic science

presented by Jennifer Singh, PhD, MPH

Jennifer Singh, PhD, MPH offers a brief history of the social and scientific conditions that have shaped autism as a genetic condition and a critique of this limited way of knowing, especially for people living with autism.

Jennifer Singh is associate professor in the School of History and Sociology and Director of Undergraduate Studies at the Ivan Allen College of Liberal Arts at Georgia Tech. Dr. Singh earned a PhD in sociology from the University of California, San Francisco and specializes in medical sociology and science and technology studies. Her research investigates the intersections of genetics, health, and society, which draws on her experiences of working in the biotechnology industry in molecular biology and as a public health researcher at the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Her book, *Multiple Autisms: Spectrums of Advocacy and*

*Genomic Science*, explores a range of perspectives from scientists, activists, parents, and people living with autism surrounding the rise and implementation of autism genetics research.
